Dear Parents,

The Easter Bunny has been here! He was seen on the school field several days this week – what a lovely surprise!

Now the evenings are lighter and the weather seems to be improving, we are seeing an increasing number of children, and young people, come to the school field in the evenings. Please can you remind your children (of all ages) that they should not be on the playground or around the paths by the school itself or taking items from any of the sheds or moving any equipment to or from the field – thank you.

To further improve our approach to safeguarding, we are increasing the security of the school field and playground. Message from Mrs Bourne: Piano/keyboard lessons

Acorn Trust have given us the go ahead to resume peripatetic lessons after Easter. An email has been sent to all existing piano/keyboard pupils to ascertain who will be resuming lessons. It would be really helpful if all could respond, if they haven't already done so, by the end of term, so that I can timetable the children. Due to my extra teaching time in Badgers next term, I may not be able to take on new pupils. When I know numbers, I will be in a position to work this out.

LEARNING CORNER:

Badgers:

This week we had an art/DT day which linked to our learning in history about the Windrush generation. We considered what Britain had gained as a result of people from the West-Indies settling here, for example, music, especially reggae, new foods and dance. We then learned about St Paul's Carnival in Bristol and how in 2018, this carnival marked the 40th anniversary of the Windrush. The 22nd June is actually 'Windrush Day' so we designed and printed T-shirts to represent The Windrush and that could be worn at a carnival.

Foxes:

This week, we have finished our learning all about the Stone Age. The children have learnt about how life in the Stone Age changed and developed across all three periods and about the sources of evidence used to gather this information. This week, we talked about what a monument is and how Stonehenge was built. Ask the children about their own theories on how the stones were transported.

In maths, we have been focusing on telling the time. Year 2 have worked hard on telling the time to 5 minutes while year 3 have learnt about telling the time on a digital clock and on a 24hour clock. Please keep practising telling the time at home.

Over the Easter holidays it is important that the children continue to read regularly and practise their maths passport targets.

Otters:

It was lovely to see the range of outfits on "Dress to express" day on Wednesday. The children talked about their choice of clothing and what makes them happy. In English we wrote and retold more of our Jim and the Jellybeanstalk story. Our Maths in the EYFS, has been based on shopping and recognising coins. Year 1 children revisited reading o'clock time, then we read half past times, drawing hands on clock faces. All week we have been looking for signs of spring, including blossom on the trees. We even saw the Easter Bunny.
