LEARNING CORNER

Badgers:

In history, we learned that we find out about the past by using different sources of evidence eg photos, paintings, diaries, artefacts etc. We used some sources to find out about Dick Turpin and to begin to consider if he were a hero or a villain.

In English, we finished our study of the narrative poem, 'The Ballad of Dick Turpin'. Next week, we are going to write stories about him.

Foxes:

This week in Foxes, on Remembrance Day, we thought about all those who lost their lives in war. We thought about all those who were part of the war effort and not just those fighting on the front line. The children spoke to Mr Branscombe over video call and asked him questions about his medals. Then Foxes looked at Mrs Steven's great Grandad's WW1 medals and Mr Barnes- Taylor's medals. Foxes could then compare the medals from different wars over the last 100 years.

In history we have been learning about what makes someone a hero. This week we learnt about Mary Seacole and discussed why she is seen as a hero. Thank you to all those who have sent in photos of hero family members serving in our armed forces. Their photos are displayed proudly on our heroes' board in the classroom

Otters:

This week we had a visit from the sandwich-bot. It followed the children's algorithm (instructions) for making a sandwich just like a computer. The results were hilarious and rather messy. The children learnt that when we program a robot or computer our instructions should be clear, accurate and in a logical order. The EYFS children all cracked an egg this week when we learnt the action for the phoneme e. We also learnt u. The Year 1 children read and wrote words containing ie (as in pie) and ea (as in stream). In English, we discussed the types toys in the story "The Old Toy Room". Year 1 also learned the meaning of some of the trickier vocabulary in the story e.g. bustled, passengers, buzzing with excitement. In maths, Year 1 investigated doubles to double 10. The EYFS children accurately counted up to 10 objects onto a tens frame and identified the appropriate numeral. Our PSHE lesson this week made us think about valuing our differences.
